

COMMUNIQUÉ No. 22 — November 12, 2020 INFORMATION To Pastors, Pastoral Teams and Religious Communities

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The beginning of a new liturgical year is fast approaching; here are some suggestions, instructions and reminders to help us move forward together, in communion with one another:

1. Advent-Christmas

a) Sharing ideas: November 18 meeting

We cannot foresee at this point in time what the public-health situation will be during the Advent and Christmas seasons. However, this uncertainty should limit neither our imaginations nor our ideas on how to prepare the Christian community for the Saviour's coming. Staff members of various diocesan services have begun to explore ideas, and, perhaps, you might have questions or ideas arising from discussions with your pastoral team. I am, therefore, inviting you to a videoconference meeting on **Wednesday, November 18**, during which we will have the opportunity to share our ideas, for example, under the following three headings:

- 1. Liturgy: How does one plan various celebrations accommodating only 25 people? How does one conduct the Sacrament of Reconciliation?
- 2. Faith enrichment: How does one support the faithful spiritually?
- 3. Fellowship: How does one tackle the sense of isolation, encourage sharing and solidarity?

Following these meetings, diocesan guidelines will be issued, specifically concerning liturgical celebrations and group activities.

b) Advent – Christmas Microsite

A diocesan microsite dedicated to Advent and Christmas is being developed for the purpose of supporting faith and hope for all ages: children, teens, adults, those living alone or in a family; it will feature prayer, listening and response. Various initiatives will be presented along with suggestions on how to approach Advent and the Christmas season in the context of this pandemic. Further details will be shared in the next communiqué.



c) Solidarity and food drive

The fourth **World Day of the Poor** will be celebrated this November 15, 2020. This year's theme "Stretch forth your hand to the poor" is thus a summons to responsibility and commitment as men and women who are part of our one human family. 2. Instructions in force

Following the weekly Zoom meetings between local "de-confinement" committees and the Diocesan 'De-confinement' Committee, regular updates are made to the website's FAQ: <u>https://bit.ly/FAQupadtes20201112</u>. We would draw your attention to certain important points, which remain in force until further notice.

- **Time allotted between celebrations:** As long as cleaning is performed thoroughly and time is permitted for ventilating the space, it is not necessary to leave an extended period between celebrations. The "three-hour" rule, which has been mentioned, does not apply in the majority of situations that concern us.
- Ventilating our spaces: Given that our churches are large, ventilating them ought to be sufficient to allay any worries for the next while. Nevertheless, always remember the following instructions: as each person arrives, check his or her general state of health, ensure a mask is being worn, that physical distancing is being observed and that every person's hands are disinfected.
- Wearing masks: On arriving at church, each person is required to wear a mask (except in certain cases as specified by law). Once seated, people may remove their masks. The mask must be put on again each time the person changes place (before going to take Communion, for example). However, after having exercised discernment, and depending on the place of worship, the local "de-confinement" committee can legitimately require participants to wear their masks at all times.
- **Participants' list:** Thank you for continuing to keep and retain these lists for 30 days. The requirement to keep the list (with names, email addresses and telephone numbers) for funerals was issued by the public-health authorities. The Assembly of Quebec Catholic Bishops recommends extending this to all celebrations. This is what we are doing in Montreal.
- **Singing during Mass:** The congregation is prohibited from singing. One person or a small choir may sing during celebrations while observing the distancing rules. We also ask you to limit social interaction inside the church following celebrations.
- Number of participants at Mass: The maximum number of participants at a celebration in the "red zone" is set at 25 people in the congregation. This excludes those leading the liturgical celebration (priest, deacon, lector, cantor, musician, altar server, ushers). Each member of a family is counted individually; this includes children.
- For Sunday Mass: Wherever possible, you are encouraged to: use parish halls (with separate entrances) for a Liturgy of the Word with Communion, for following Mass broadcast online, and to station Eucharistic ministers for people who are not able to enter the church due to numbers.
- **Sacramental celebrations:** With the exception of funerals, it is strongly advised that scheduled sacramental celebrations be postponed. However, having exercised discernment, exceptions may be permitted.
- **Catechesis:** Until further notice, the situation still requires the cancellation of classroom catechetical sessions. Maintaining communication with families and individuals is important, even if catechetical instruction is restricted. All efforts to maintain contact is important (virtual means, by telephone, etc.).
- **Dispensation:** Archbishop Lépine is extending the dispensation from the Sunday obligation, which remains valid during the pandemic until further notice.
